What to Expect

The 2025 Writers' Conference will be a significant gathering of writers and those who love literature. You can expect to learn from incredible authors in the ballroom, attend stimulating workshops and advanced classes where you will hone your craft, and benefit from amazing opportunities to connect with other readers, writers and industry experts. This year's event (2025) is also about choice. You can choose your own adventure with a wide array of events, workshops, panels, and speakers from which to select. This year's program will engage, invigorate, and stimulate you!

Ticketing, Registration & Scheduling

1. Badge Pick Up Times & Location for Package or Bundle Holders*

Badge pick-up for package and bundle holders begins the day before the conference. Please stop by our registration desk in the lobby of the [Hotel Real de Minas](#) (where the conference will take place) during the following times:

- Tuesday, February 11 from 11:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.
- Wednesday, February 12 from 8:00 a.m. to 6:45 p.m.
- Thursday, February 13–Sunday, February 16 from 8:15 a.m. to 6:45 p.m.

While badges will be available for pick-up all week, we highly recommend you stop as early as possible (either during the day on Tuesday or early Wednesday morning) to obtain your badge and program materials so you can arrive **by 9am to the Open Plenary on Day 1** (Wednesday).

A note for Patrons: You are welcome to pick up your badge on Tuesday at our registration desk or on Wednesday at the Patron Hospitality Suite.

**Not a badge or bundle holder? Please read #3 below for how general ticketing will work.*

2. How Ticketing Works & What to Bring When Picking Up Your Badge

All tickets are e-tickets (no physical tickets are sent) and are delivered via email after purchase. Your order confirmation is your ticket.

The only thing you need to bring when picking up your badge is a form of ID. **You do NOT need to bring a printed order confirmation** as our team will have the name of the ticket buyer in our records.

Multiple individual ticket holders must arrive together, as only the buyer's name will appear on the attendee list.

3. Accessing Events for Individual Event Ticket-Holders

If you did NOT purchase a package or a bundle and instead, purchased individual tickets for one or more events, simply give your name at the door of the event you're attending and bring an ID. Our team will have an attendee list for all events that require prior registration.

4. Tickets Sales Before and During the Conference

Though our packages have sold out, you can still buy individual tickets online for select workshops and events by heading over to our [à la carte menu](#).

If you'd like to purchase a last-minute ticket while you're at the conference, and that event hasn't yet sold out, you can do so at the registration desk in the lobby of the hotel at least 30 minutes before the event.

5. Registration Desk General Hours

Otherwise, faculty has been/will be in touch with you or your workshop does not require one. We recommend checking the list in advance so you can download or print anything you may need, as there are no on-site printing services (more on that below).

In addition to handouts, we encourage you to **bring a notebook and pen or your own laptop** for note-taking and writing exercises.

Printing Services

There are no printers available at the hotel. If you need to print documents, we recommend visiting one of the nearby print shops: Araiza Computación is at Ancha de San Antonio 119-B. About a two-minute walk further on the Ancha de San Antonio is Servimax at El Cardo I. Our concierge can orient you to these locations.

Being on Time

Please make every effort to arrive on time for all conference events, including keynotes and workshops. We understand there's a lot to fit in, but punctuality ensures a smooth experience for everyone. Late arrivals, especially for keynotes, may not be accommodated.

Bookstore

Our bookstore will feature books from our keynote speakers, faculty, and [San Miguel Literary Sala](#) authors. The bookstore will be cashless, and credit cards will be required for purchases.

A note for published authors: Some of you have asked if you can sell your books at our bookstore. Unfortunately, it is too late to do that for this year's conference but we invite you to become a [Literary Sala member](#) and sell your books with us at our bookstore in 2026.

The average temperature in February ranges from 55°F/12°C to 75°F/23°C. This year has been particularly cold, especially in the mornings, **so please dress warmly and in layers**, so you can stay comfortable throughout the day. Good walking shoes are also important. San Miguel is built on a hill with many cobblestone streets.

Pesos

While many places in San Miguel accept credit cards (including the Conference Bookstore), you'll want to have some pesos on hand for taxis (these typically cost 80 Mexican pesos or around USD 4 to get anywhere in Centro/Downtown) and smaller transactions. We recommend using your ATM card to withdraw pesos at a good exchange rate. There is an ATM at the hotel and we also recommend using the ATM at the airport if you are flying in.

Safety in San Miguel

In spite of the recent news reports about increases in violence in Mexico, a holiday in San Miguel de Allende is safer than vacationing in some parts of the U.S. San Miguel is a great distance from the cartel wars and highway robberies and it is safe to travel from the airports (León, Querétaro, Mexico City) to San Miguel either by car, shuttle, or bus. Walking the streets of San Miguel during the day and in the evenings is also safe. Please read [our FAQs](#) for further information.

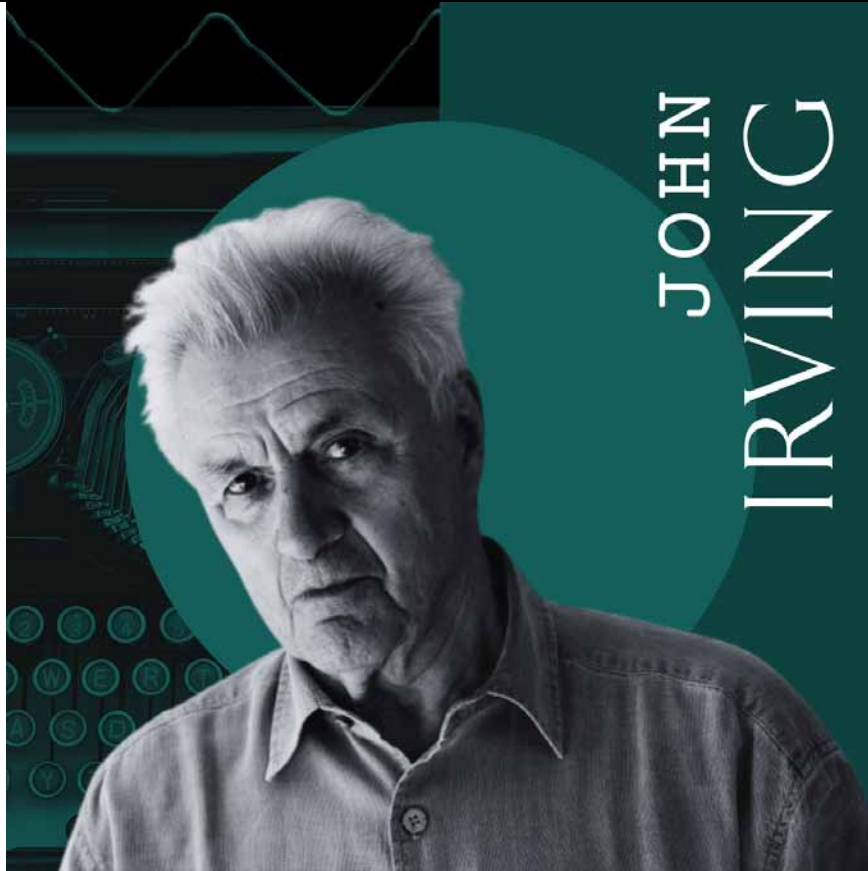

“My Sixteenth Novel: Queen Esther”

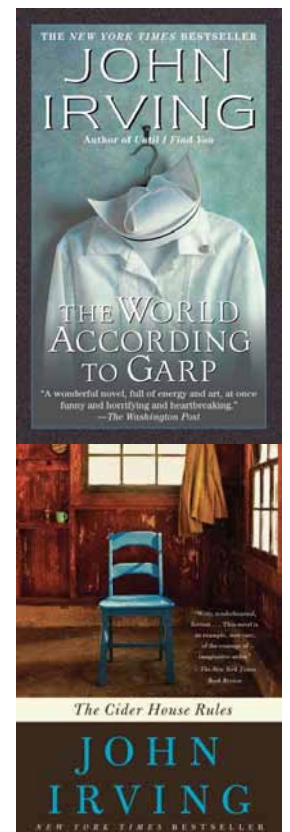
Dr. Larch, the obstetrician and abortionist in *The Cider House Rules*, is also a character in *Queen Esther*, my new novel. Larch is younger than you remember him, and there’s a different cast of characters among the unadopted orphans in Maine. This time, there’s a Jewish orphan—born in Vienna in 1905. Her father died on board the ship from Germany; her mother was murdered by anti-Semites in Portland.

John Irving has written sixteen novels over the course of his prolific career, the majority of which have been international bestsellers, and which have been translated into more than thirty-five languages. His beloved titles include *The World According to Garp*, which won the National Book Award; *Cider House Rules*; *A Widow for One Year*; and *A Prayer for Owen Meany*, which is his bestselling novel in every language. Irving won an Oscar for Best Adapted Screenplay for *Cider House Rules*. His first novel, *Setting Free the Bears*, was published in 1968 when he was twenty-six years old.

Irving was also a competitive wrestler for twenty years. He coached wrestling until he was forty-seven. In 1992, he was inducted into the National Wrestling Hall of Fame in Stillwater, Oklahoma.

Irving lives in Toronto and is a dual citizen of the United States and Canada.





“The Art of Contemporary Fiction”

Percival Everett is a master at taking well-known literary styles and flipping them on their heads to help readers view the world through creative new lenses. In this engaging talk, he will share fascinating anecdotes about how he created his diverse bibliography. We will discover the historical events, societal issues, and literary influences that have inspired the range of subjects he tackles in his works and how and why he takes a unique approach to the creative process.

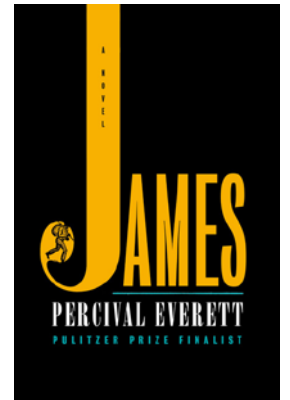

Percival Everett, one of the most innovative writers in contemporary American literature, is the Distinguished Professor of English at the University of Southern California.

He has written more than thirty books including novels, poetry, and short story collections which have won numerous prizes and international accolades. His captivating and immensely diverse collection of genre-bending literary works challenges and inspires readers to contemplate and reconsider the societal and cultural forces that shape our worldviews.

His most recent books include *James*, an instant *New York Times* bestseller and named a best book of the year by the *New York Times Book Review*; *Dr. No*, finalist for the NBCC Award for Fiction and winner of the PEN/Jean Stein Book Award; *The Trees*, finalist for the Booker Prize and the PEN/Faulkner Award for Fiction; *Telephone*, finalist for the Pulitzer Prize; *So Much Blue*; *Erasure*; and *I Am Not Sidney Poitier*. He has received the NBCC Ivan Sandrof Life Achievement Award and The Windham Campbell Prize from Yale University. *American Fiction*, the feature film based on his novel *Erasure*, was released in 2023.

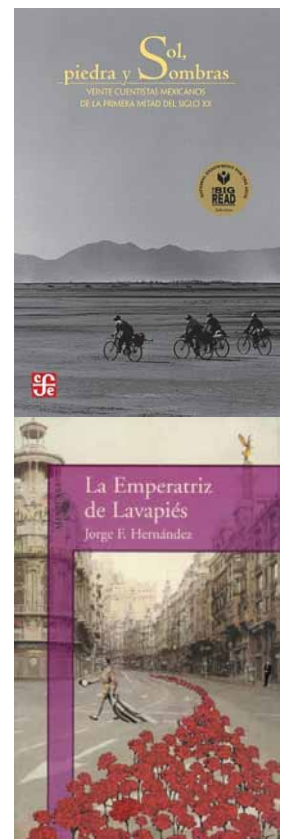
Jorge F. Hernández is the author of five novels, three short story collections, and numerous essays and newspaper columns over many years. Of special interest to us in San Miguel, he wrote *Microhistory of the Sanctuary of Atonilco*, for which he won the Atanasio G. Saravia National Prize for Banamex Regional History.

His anthology entitled *Sun, Stone and Shadows: Twenty Mexican Short Story Writers from the First Half of the 20th Century* was chosen for the United States government reading program as a book in The Big Read of the National Endowment for the Arts, in its English translation.

He has taught at various institutions in both Mexico and Spain including UNAM, ITAM, Universidad Anáhuac, the Hellenic Cultural Center, and the Foundation for Mexican Letters.

As a radio personality, he was host of the “Golpe de dados,” a cultural news program on channel 22 of Mexican television during 2010. He collaborated with Leo Zuckerman and Julio Patán on the program “Artículo Sexto” on Radio Formula in 2012 and 2013.

Jorge F. Hernández was Minister of Cultural Affairs of the Mexican Embassy in Spain and Director of the Cultural Institute of Mexico in Madrid. He also helped to rescue the oldest bookstore in Madrid, which had been destined to become a pizza parlor! He was born in Mexico City and spent his childhood in Cologne, Germany, and Washington, D.C. where his father was a diplomat for Mexico’s foreign service.

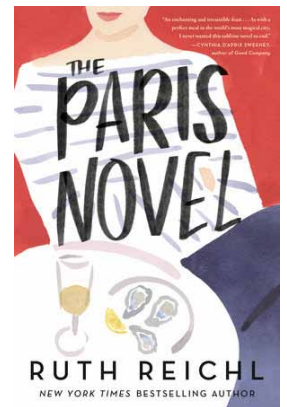

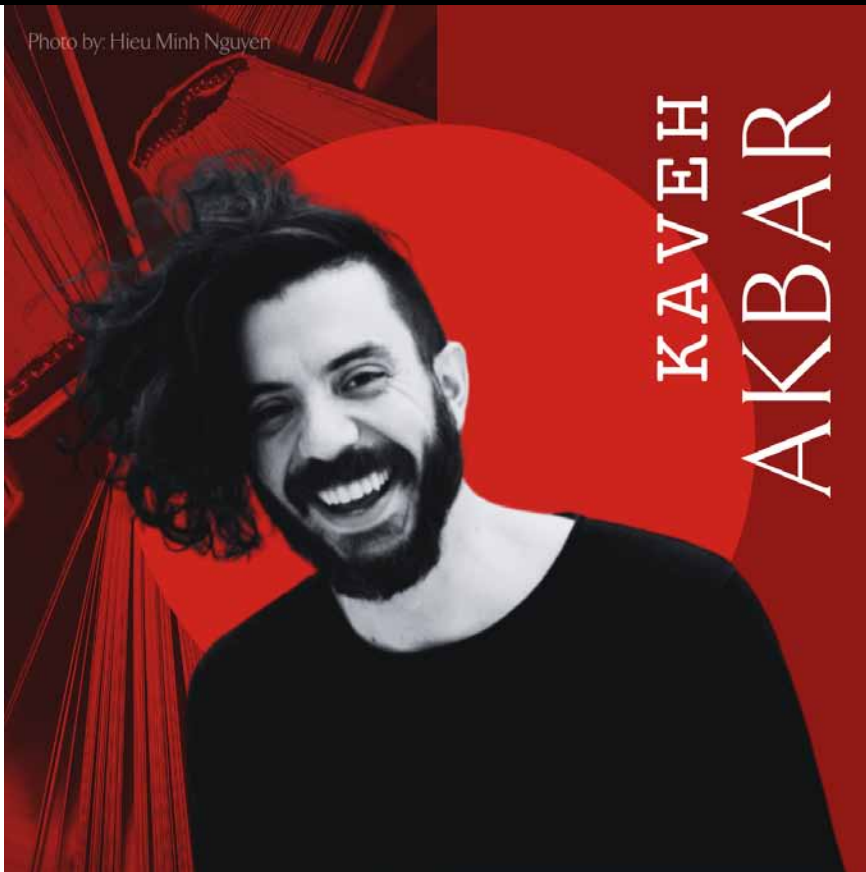
Ruth Reichl is an American chef, food writer and editor who, for ten years, was the editor-in-chief of *Gourmet Magazine*. In addition to two decades as a food critic for the *Los Angeles Times* and the *New York Times*, Reichl has also written cookbooks, memoirs and novels. She was culinary editor for the Modern Library and has won six James Beard Foundation Awards.

Reichl was co-producer of PBS's *Gourmet Diary of a Foodie* and was host of PBS's *Gourmet's Adventures with Ruth*.

Her memoirs are *Tender at the Bone: Growing Up at the Table* (1998), *Comfort Me with Apples: More Adventures at the Table*, *Garlic and Sapphires: The Secret Life of a Critic in Disguise*, *Not Becoming My Mother*, and *Save Me the Plums: My Gourmet Memoir* (2019). In 2009, she published *Gourmet Today*, a 1,008-page cookbook containing over 1,000 recipes.

She published her first novel *Delicious!* in 2014 and, in 2015, published *My Kitchen Year: 136 Recipes That Saved My Life*, a memoir of recipes prepared in the year following the shuttering of *Gourmet*. Her most recent novel is entitled *The Paris Novel*.





**“The Word Dropped Like
a Stone: Sacred Poetics
Under the Reign of the
Money God”**

Interesting poetry awakens us, asks us to slow down our metabolization of language, to become aware of its materiality, how it enters into us. Sacred poetry, from antiquity to the present, teaches us to be comfortable sitting in mystery without trying to resolve it, to be skeptical of unqualified certitudes. In discussing poems across the centuries—from “Hymn to Inanna” to Szyborska—Akbar reminds us that language has history, density, complexity. Such poetry, Akbar says, becomes a potent antidote against an empire that would use “the raw overwhelm of meaningless language” to cudgel us into inaction.

Kaveh Akbar’s poems appear in *The New Yorker*, *The New York Times*, *Paris Review*, *Best American Poetry*, and elsewhere. He is the author of two poetry collections: *Pilgrim Bell* (Graywolf 2021) and *Calling a Wolf a Wolf* (Alice James 2017), in addition to a chapbook, *Portrait of the Alcoholic* (Sibling Rivalry 2016). He is also the editor of *The Penguin Book of Spiritual Verse: 100 Poets on the Divine* (Penguin Classics 2022).

In 2020 Kaveh was named Poetry Editor of *The Nation*. The recipient of honors including multiple Pushcart Prizes, a Civitella Ranieri Foundation Fellowship, and the Levis Reading Prize.

Kaveh was born in Tehran, Iran, and teaches at the University of Iowa and in the low-residency MFA programs at Randolph College and Warren Wilson. In 2014, Kaveh founded *Divedapper*, a home for dialogues with the most vital voices in American poetry. With Sarah Kay and Claire Schwartz, he wrote a weekly column for the *Paris Review* called “Poetry RX.”

Clement is the only woman to hold the office of President of PEN International, 2015 to 2021. Under her leadership, the groundbreaking PEN International Women's Manifesto and The Democracy of the Imagination Manifesto were created. Jennifer Clement has received awards for both her writing and her humanitarian work, including fellowships from Guggenheim, NEA, MacDowell and Santa Maddalena; a Hispanics in Philanthropy Award for her contribution to Latino Communities; the 2023 Freedom of Expression Honorary title for World Press Day in Brussels; and numerous other awards.

Clement was raised in Mexico City. Together with her sister Barbara Sibley, she founded and ran Poetry Week every January in San Miguel de Allende for many years.

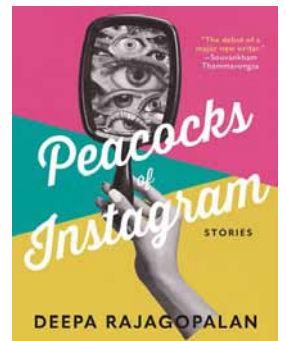

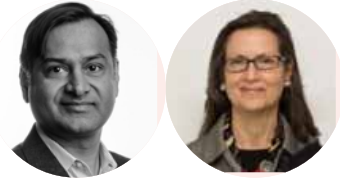

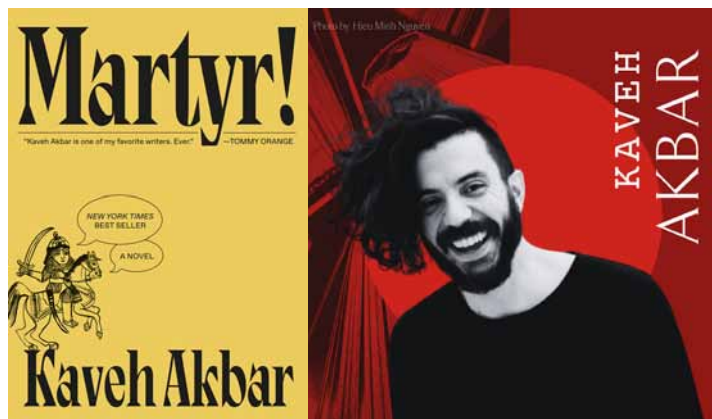

EXCURSIONS

HALF-DAY HORSEBACK RIDING

The main canyon of the region and the ranches where our horseback adventures take place are located 30 minutes southwest from town. INTOWN HORSEBACK PUB CRAWL

If you really want to feel like cowboys of old then take a ride with us to explore the oldest and most historical traditional CANTINAS (swinging door saloons) in San Miguel on horseback! Be instantly transported back to times of old where you will enjoy San Miguel's urban landscape from this unique perspective. An experience truly reminiscent of the Wild West! We ride from one to the other, hearing funny anecdotes that the bartenders and the locals have to share and toasting to future adventures.

CAÑADA DE LA VIRGEN ARCHAEOLOGICAL SITE

Join our expert guides on an exploration of the the amazing monuments left behind by an ancient civilization that reached these northernmost limits of what is known as Mesoamerica. There are more than 1,200 registered archeological sites in the state of Guanajuato, and of those sites Cañada de La Virgen is one of the most important and most highly visited. Come discover how the Cañada de La Virgen site served as a very important sacred ceremonial center, and as a burial ground for a very few and select elite. It also functioned as a highly precise solar and lunar clock and calendar! This amazing tour is followed up by a delicious ranch-style meal served by the ranch women.

HIKING AT THE CANYON

The hiking excursion takes a total of five hours to and from San Miguel, and includes transportation, two and a half hours of hiking time and rest stops, and one delicious ranch-style meal served right after the hike. The first part of this invigorating adventure takes us down along the canyon bottom for an amazing canyon river run. The rest stops are scheduled along the way at the most scenic locations so that guests can take full advantage of the most outstanding photo opportunities. The views from the cliffs upon reaching the canyon's rim are spectacular in every direction and are sure to take your breath away. The best thing of all might very well be the delicious, home cooked meal that the ranch women prepare for us at the end of our incredible journey!

HOT AIR BALLOON FLIGHT

We fly just about every day of the week, always in the early morning hours. We fly at sunrise to guarantee the best weather conditions. We meet at 6:00 a.m. (time and place to be confirmed). First, we take you to the edge of town where you will get to watch how the balloons and equipment are prepared. Once the Captain says we're ready, we launch into the sky floating effortlessly over San Miguel de Allende and its beautiful surrounding countryside. Sometimes we fly just a few meters from the ground and tree-tops, and other times we soar high above the clouds on different air currents.

ATOTONILCO

Known as Mexico's Sistine Chapel, the Santuario de Atotonilco is a vitally important church in the nearby hamlet of Atotonilco. Located 11 km north of San Miguel, Atotonilco is known for its role in the struggle for Mexican independence. National hero Ignacio Allende was married here in 1802, and eight years later he returned with Miguel Hidalgo and a band of independence rebels en route from Dolores to San Miguel to take the shrine's banner of the Virgin of Guadalupe as their flag. Inside, the sanctuary has six chapels and is vibrant with statues, murals and paintings. The church was named a UNESCO World Heritage site in 2008. It's free to visit the main part of the church, with its famous frescos, but a small entrance fee is required to visit the side-chapel with depictions of scenes from the Last Judgment.

We will also visit Galeria Atotonilco, widely regarded as the finest exhibition and sale of Mexican folk art in the entire country and Trip Advisor's #1 attraction in San Miguel. The gallery owners travel all over Mexico to find the finest traditional work being created. Each purchase supports a family and village working hard to keep the ancient tradition of their village thriving. You will see legendary ceramics, wood carvings, paper maché, baskets, historic photographs, and much more.

I11 Scene Building in Memoir and Fiction: Drafting a Dramatic Scene in Steps

For those who have been trying to construct book-length projects in terms of chapters, Susan Brown, Ph.D., teaches the important distinction between a scene and a chapter. A “chapter” is made up of scenes, while a “scene” is a dramatic mini-narrative. We will study the essential elements in an effective dramatic scene and practice the steps for building one. I 22 Embracing Uncertainty: A Generative Workshop of Discovery and Surprise

Nepantla is a Nahuatl word that means "in the middle of things," and will be referencing this word with conflict and resolution. Isis will give a brief history of nepantla, meta-types and avatars. When considering narrative structure, writers often lean on familiar models like Freitag's triangle, Save the Cat, Hero's Journey, and others. Yet structural choices are far more fluid, intuitive, and inventive. This workshop will introduce some innovative approaches to narrative, suggesting new ways to find the ideal structure for a book-length project. We'll have an opportunity to draft and share a visual map of our work-in-progress.

W12 The Perfect Storm: Devices for Creating Suspense in Literary Memoir and Fiction

SUSAN SUTLIFF BROWN | CRAFT OF WRITING

Literary fiction and memoir have always had less commercial success compared with commercial genre fiction, such as mysteries and romances. One way of making serious literature commercially viable is to take a page from mega-blockbusters and create enough suspense at the opening of a project to keep a reader up all night. Joyce scholar Susan Brown, also a student of trash lit, will show us effective devices for turning a serious literary project into a page-turner without sacrificing quality.

W13 Time in Memoir: A Chronology of Its Own

JUDY REEVES | MEMOIR & PERSONAL ESSAY

This workshop looks at how writers control time in telling their story. Not every memoir is in chronological order. Most memoirs move both forward and backward in time, slip-sliding from past to present and back again. The most successful memoirs aren't simply a recounting of events, but the memoirist's discovery of the connections among events—not necessarily sequential—and the weaving of those events into a narrative that reveals a meaning deeper than a mere chronology of one thing happening after another.

W14 Maximize Your Literary Agent Pitch Session

ANNA KNUTSON GELLER | LITERARY AGENT

A literary agent who's been on the receiving end of many pitches will share tips and tricks on what makes a strong impression on agents, and what turns them off. Learn how to succinctly and professionally contextualize your book and pitch it authoritatively, improving your chances of receiving a request for material. Time will be allotted for practicing pitches, allowing you to go to your

pitch session with greater confidence and less nerves, and maybe even have a little fun while you're at it.

W15 Writing Through Grief: Bringing Our Broken-Open Heart to the Page

JUDYTH HILL | POETRY

Poetry often calls to us in transitional and difficult times: during times of loss, death, divorce. Our stories and emotions beg to pour onto the page. When we heal, we restore what feels broken to wholeness. Poetry can reknit the self: the process of choosing and weaving together words can re-story the self into a new wholeness: by giving our courageous, sorrowing hearts voice. Accompanied by transformative poetry, we'll write our way through grief ... to gift.

W16 Business Author's Workshop: Writing to Elevate Your Personal and Business Brand

This workshop is for business owners, entrepreneurs, executives, and CEOs aiming to elevate their brands through business writing. W23 Essential Questions: Evoking Emotional Resonance With Your Readers From Ask to Answer

Essential questions are universal, archetypal questions that invite a reader to journey with the author toward satisfying and stimulating answers. In memoir, as well as fiction, they are questions authors are seeking to answer for themselves; for writers of fiction, they are questions each character carries with them, guiding their actions. In this workshop, we will define essential questions, argue for their crucial role in creating emotional resonance with readers, and offer participants a list of essential questions for their consideration.

W24 Ready, Set, Publish: Getting Your Writing (and Author Platform) Ready for Success

COURTNEY MAUM | PUBLISHING & MARKETING

From writing game-changing query letters to doing platform in a way that feels authentic (and even joyful) to dealing with feelings of envy in a notably competitive industry, author and book coach Courtney Maum will share the most important things she's learned

from publishing her own books and working with ambitious writers. She'll walk us through the most important milestones we'll need to hit to meet our publishing goals.

W25 Books Are Movies: How to Use Screenwriting Tools to Write Your Novel

A.J. BERMUDEZ | SCREEN & PLAYWRITING

From concept to execution, this interactive workshop will explore how screenwriting tools can be effectively (and excitingly) leveraged toward other forms of writing, especially the novel. W3 1 Come Late, Leave Early: Building Scene Momentum with Timing

This skill can transform an average story into one that is compelling and highly marketable. We can practice this new skill on works in progress.

W3 2 Subtext: The Power of the Unspoken

ROBERT FALLS | CRAFT OF WRITING

Subtext, the hidden emotional truth in storytelling, enriches narratives across genres by engaging readers' minds. Led by theater director Robert Falls, this workshop explores techniques for creating layered narratives through writing exercises. We'll learn to add depth to scenes by incorporating undercurrents of meaning in action, dialogue, and characters' thoughts. By delving into characters' unreliability and what's left unsaid, we'll extend scenes beyond the written word, captivating readers with hidden layers of meaning.

W3 3 Craft Matters: Eight Tricks of the Trade Every Memoir Writer

Should Consider

JENNIFER LEIGH SELIG | MEMOIR & PERSONAL ESSAY

Popular memoir teacher and award-winning author Jennifer Leigh Selig will focus on eight essential craft elements that make memoir pages come alive: sensory detail, dialogue, cultural references, interior monologue, tense and personal pronoun choices, metaphor, and the power of repetition. She'll illustrate each element with rich examples from popular memoirs. We'll leave the workshop with a toolkit of trade techniques to craft our memoirs-in-progress or polish our writing to make it shine even brighter.

W3 4 What Publishers Want (and Authors Need)

SAM HIYATE | LITERARY AGENT

Now my manuscript is complete, what do I do? How do I write a query letter that stands out? What are editors really looking for? Most importantly, how do I know my work is ready for submission? Sam Hiyate will answer these and many other questions as he tells us about the publishing market's needs, wants, and trends in the United States and internationally. There will be time to critique query letters from the class.

W3 5 Hinges, Swerves, and Voltas: How Poems Move

MICHAEL BAZZETT | POETRY

Given that "verse" comes from the Latin for "turn," the pivot at the end of the line is, on the most basic level, what makes a poem a poem. Using models both classic and contemporary, this playful, generative workshop will delve into the architecture of poems, from the possibilities opened by techniques as basic as enjambement to elements of reversal and surprise in content and point of view, where poems turn on a dime and open up whole new vistas.

W3 6 In Brief: Explorations in Short Nonfiction

JOANNE B. MULCAHY | MEMOIR & PERSONAL ESSAY

Charles Simic calls them "memory fragments." Other writers describe "micro essays," "flash nonfiction," or simply "shorts." Like flash fiction and poetry, brief nonfiction is complete in itself, or it may be part of a larger structure. We'll read examples from several anthologies and the journal *Brevity* to see how different writers capture entire worlds in concise forms. We'll generate our own brief essays, memoirs, portraits, or travelogues.

W3 7 Transformative Eco-Poetry by Joy Harjo and Craig Santos Perez

CHERYL J. FISH | PLEASURES OF READING

In this workshop, we'll explore the powerful ecological and indigenous contexts of poets Joy Harjo, U.S. Poet Laureate and member of the Mvskoke Nation, and Craig Santos Perez, a native Chamoru (Chamorro) from the Pacific Island of Guåhan/Guam. Both poets meld experience with their ancestry, geographical situatedness, and spiritual and ecological accountability. With startling language and poetic magic that enlarges our relationship to plants, animals, and land, these poets have us reconsider assumptions.

W4 1 Perfect Your Beginnings: The First 500 Words

ANN PATTY | CRAFT OF WRITING

Most editors and agents, like most readers, make very quick decisions about whether to commit to a book. As an editor and publisher for major New York City trade houses for more than 30 years, Ann Patty sometimes rejected manuscripts without ever getting past the first paragraph or page. In this class, we'll discuss what makes a compelling beginning and analyze as a group the first 500 words of our own writing, submitted in advance. Class size is limited to 12 participants.

W4 2 Creating an Unforgettable Villain: What Writers Can Learn From Shakespeare

ROBERT FALLS | CRAFT OF WRITING

To master the art of creating a formidable antagonist, we turn to Shakespeare. In this workshop, led by award-winning director Robert Falls, we'll dissect Shakespeare's approach to villainy. We'll study iconic antagonists like Iago and Lady Macbeth to understand how their complex motives and actions create gripping narratives. Through character analysis and writing exercises, we'll learn to craft villains that challenge protagonists and captivate readers.

W4 3 Tell Me a Story: Using the Techniques of Fiction to Craft a Compelling Memoir

JUDY REEVES | MEMOIR & PERSONAL ESSAY

When we say, "Tell me a story," what we really mean is "Transport me to another place and time where I can experience something interesting—maybe even captivating—with the characters." Memoir readers expect the storytelling qualities of fiction: character, plot, setting, description, dialogue, and scene. In this workshop, we'll explore such fiction techniques for defining story, theme, narrative arc, and point of view. We'll learn how to apply these techniques to our memoirs.

W4 4 Everyone's a Hero

MICHAEL CARR | LITERARY AGENT

It's said that everyone is the hero of his or her own story. However, the antagonist often wants the same thing as the protagonist. With a shift in storytelling, the antagonist could be our point-of-view character. Knowing this can help us write effective opposition to our protagonist. We will explore how to create villains who are

strong enough to stand up to our hero and who will stick with readers long after the last page has been turned.

W4 5 Writing for the Change You Want to See in the World: Be a Voice for What You Love

JUDYTH HILL | POETRY

This workshop is based on what inspired Judyth Hill to write the internationally famous poem "Wage Peace" and what she learned from writing it. It will be a high-energy, hands-on, how-to workshop with inspiring exercises and handouts jam-packed with stirring global poetry that speaks for, sings for, and brings change. We'll learn to write lyrically, passionately, and effectively for peace and climate attention; age, racial, and gender equality—whatever is important to us. We'll leave with exciting, usable tools to powerfully explore and offer our vision as activist-artists. Bring a work in progress (all genres welcome).

W4 6 Writing the Blank Spaces: Hybrid Forms and Autofiction in Memoir

TARA MCGUIRE | MEMOIR & PERSONAL ESSAY

When Tara McGuire's son Holden died of an overdose, she felt compelled to write about the effect his death had on her—even though she didn't know what had happened. These "blank spaces" often block us from engaging with and completing personal narratives in which some facts are missing. This workshop will explore how to develop plot lines and shape scenes we've never witnessed. We'll learn craft devices to help navigate uncertainty and the ethical responsibility of personal stories.

W4 7 John Steinbeck: An American in Mexico

SUSAN SHILLINGLAW | PLEASURES OF READING

John Steinbeck's writings often explored cultural differences between the U.S. and Mexico. Over a third of his work is either about Mexico or includes Mexican characters, such as his 1935 novel *Tortilla Flat*. Steinbeck poses interesting questions about cultural engagement: from his 1940 trip to Baja with marine biologist Edward F. Ricketts, *Sea of Cortez* (1940), to three films he worked on, all located in Mexico: *The Forgotten Village* (1940), *La Perla* (1947), and *Viva Zapata!* (1952). We will explore Steinbeck's fascination with Mexico.

W5 1 The Eight-Point Plan: What Writers Need

to Know to Plot with Confidence

APRIL BOSSHARD | FICTION

Do you resist plotting? Does the process seem mysterious or intimidating? It doesn't need to be. Plotting can be one of the most creative and fun parts of the story-making process. With the underlying understanding that plots must meet the criteria of being causal, coherent, and credible, this hands-on workshop presents and plays with the eight essential elements we need to know before planning a plot, so we can move forward with clarity and confidence—and have some fun.

W5 2 Mining Personal Experience for Storytelling Gold

SHILPI SOMAYA GOWDA | FICTION

"Write what you know," an oft-repeated phrase, is an oversimplification, particularly if we hope to have long and varied careers. Instead, we must learn how to find those seeds of ideas in our personal lives and leverage our imaginations to amplify them into fully-fledged stories. Soco Aguilar is an independent writer, film and animation producer, and screenwriter working from San Miguel de Allende, Mexico City, and Austin. She is an award-winning Mexican filmmaker who writes and produces live-action and documentary feature films.

Soco's experience includes producing documentary content for PBS, BBC, and Discovery Channel, as well as other independent projects. In 2008, she won the Ariel (the Mexican equivalent of the Oscar) for Best Animated Production for *La leyenda de la Nahuala* (2007), which has become a classic on Netflix. The film influenced a series acquired by Disney in 2021. Universal Pictures distributed two other feature films: a live-action film, *Todo Incluido / All Inclusive* (2009), and a 2D animated film, *Nikté* (2009).

The first documentary Soco produced solo, *No Turning Back* (1994), was filmed in Chiapas, Mexico, and focused on the genesis of the Zapatista movement. In 2020, *The New Yorker* named *El diablo nunca duerme* (1995) by Lourdes Portillo as one of the 62 films that have shaped the art of documentary. Lourdes was her mentor, and this was the first film she helped produce. Today, Soco is marketing her latest project: *Si quieres que te amen, ama*, a live-action feature film she wrote and will produce, created to appeal to a broad, intercultural audience. Soco is also an adjunct professor of film and an advisor at the Tecnológico de Monterrey.

ALEJANDRA ARÉVALO

Alejandra Arévalo (Monterrey, 1988) graduated from the Mexican Literature program at the UANL (2010). She began her reading online program, "Sputnik," in 2013. Since then she has specialized in online reading mediation through different channels such as Twitter, Instagram, TikTok, and Telegram, focusing on social media and digital strategies. In 2016, she started a collective, now a non-profit, along with 10 other women called Librosb4tipos to make female intellectual work visible, specifically in literature. She is the author of *Lucrecias* and *Tribu de Lectoras*.
